Conference Program

The 2009 program will emphasize high-impact applications and research on the difficult issues at the leading edges of the field. It will consist of invited and contributed sessions and workshops demonstrating the state of the art in the theory and application of system dynamics. We will also schedule exhibits, model-assistance workshops, panel discussions, special sessions, a student colloquium and the business meetings of the society. There will be time for social and professional interaction in a relaxed, historic setting.

The bulk of the presentations will be based on full papers submitted through the regular process and placed in the existing program threads:

- Business applications
- Complexity/agent-based/nonlinear
- Economic dynamics
- Education
- Energy and resources
- Environment and ecology
- Health
- Information science
- Methodology: alternative approaches
- Methodology in system dynamics

- Military applications
- Operations management/supply chains
- Organizational dynamics
- Psychology/social dynamics
- Public policy
- Qualitative system dynamics
- Security
- Strategy

The conference will be hosted by national laboratories, and we anticipate many first-time participants to attend. We expect a strong interest in the application of system dynamics to major issues such as:

- Climate change
- Infrastructure resilience

- Emergency preparedness
- Challenges of terrorism

We look forward to adding one or more new threads to deal with such issues. *Proposals for new threads are encouraged and are due by Nov. 15, 2008.*

A new feature in 2009 will be the addition of an optional, "spillover" day, on Friday, July 31st. The extra day will be useful for groups that wish to organize informally. Chapters and interest groups will have a better opportunity to share information in much greater depth than before. The extra day coincides with a collaborative meeting of the K-12 community, so there will be opportunity for sharing of experiences in system dynamics education. *Proposals for activities on the Spillover Day are encouraged and due by Nov. 15, 2008.*

Conference Venue and Lodging

The Conference will be held at the **Hotel Albuquerque at Old Town**. Their conference facilities are excellent, and their location is ideal: http://www.virtualalbuquerque.com/VirtualABQ/HotelAlbuquerque/

The guest-room price is affordable (***\$140/night**). However, they have a limited capacity of 188 rooms. These will be taken on a first-come, first-serve basis. The overflow hotel is across the street (*****\$120/night), at a short walking distance (**<**0.2 miles): http://www.riograndeinn.com/

For the students interested, we will arrange with UNM to provide inexpensive dorm accommodations (~\$30/night). The Campus is not far from the conference venue (<4 miles), but those staying there will need to use public transportation.

Minimum Food & Beverage Commitment

The conference space will be available to us free of charge. However, we do have a commitment to expend a minimum of \$38,000 in food and beverage. The bulk of this expense will be used to cover the Conference Banquet. The rest will probably be used in complimentary coffee breaks. Depending upon the weather, our banquet will be outdoors in the pavilion and gardens. Otherwise, it will be in the ballroom.

The Society Office has the **Contract** signed with the conference hotel.

Conference Partners and "Local" Sponsorship

Sandia already committed \$7,500 in support of the 2009 Conference. The Sandia contribution came from three groups: System Engineering & Analysis, Geosciences Research & Applications, and Computational Science Research & Development. We are currently seeking Conference Partners (sponsors at a level greater than \$5K) and will be working more intensively on this front from here on. Some of the potential sources of "local" funding are cohost organizations, our sponsoring agencies and clients, such as the Department of Homeland Security, The Boeing Company, GM, BP, Lockheed Martin Corporation, and members of the local business and government communities, including Intel, the State of New Mexico, and the City of Albuquerque. Although this is an impressive list of organizations, we offer no certainty of success. However, we aim to bring enough *new* sponsorship to fund the **Welcome Reception** and the **Poster Symposium & Buffet**.

Special K-12 activities

We are working with a number of people interested in K-12 ST/SD Education in preparing for 2009, and offering a service to this community during the conference.

We initiated a series of training workshops in partnership with the Waters Foundation, supported and sponsored by Sandia Community Involvement, including a 1-Day Overview of System Dynamics based upon Fish Banks, Inc. on February 16th, and the Waters Foundation's 4-Day Level 1 Workshop in Systems Thinking, July 8-11. For the 2009 Conference, in coordination with the Chair of the Education Thread, the Creative Learning Exchange, the Waters Foundation, we are embracing a three-tiered approach to carry out special activities in parallel, during and after the conference:

<u>Tier 1</u>: A series of workshops especially tailored to K-12 teachers would be offered on Thursday, and Friday would entail a collaborative of K-12 practitioners to share experiences, ask questions of SD experts, discuss future possibilities, etc. Friday could be a full day or half day depending on the anticipated number of participants

<u>Tier 2</u>: In addition to Tier 1, encourage experienced SD experts interested in K-12 education to submit papers to be considered for up to two Wednesday Education Parallel Sessions. The first parallel session would focus on an SD curriculum adapted to K-12 and the second would remain open and/or TBD. The Thread Chair would help encourage skilled and proven SD folks to contribute to these sessions. The CLE and the Waters Foundation do not plan on encouraging K-12 practitioners to submit papers, however some may. If so, those papers will be held to the same standards as all others. Ideally, the Wednesday Education Sessions should be appealing to all SD levels of participants –including those at the novice level of SD and those who are quite experienced. K-12 teachers would be encouraged to attend these Education Sessions.

<u>Tier 3</u>: In addition to Tiers 1 and 2, we want to consider offering a 3-day beginning training for K-12 educators Monday through Wednesday, in parallel to the Conference. The training would be held at a site across the street from the main conference hotel. The space is quite nice, accessible and appropriate for a three-day training session. This training would be an adaptation of the Waters Foundation 4-day Level 1 training. The participants would also participate in the Thursday and Friday opportunities at the conference and maybe even step across the street and attend a Wednesday parallel session if time allows. This 5-day experience would provide beginners with skill-building, opportunities to collaborate with practicing K-12 educators and chances to network with and learn from SD experts.

We plan on attending the **K-12 Open Discussion** (Wednesday, 10:30AM) and <u>look forward to your input on how the 2009 Conference can best serve this important community of interest/agenda</u>.

Social Agenda




Core expense: A minimum of \$38,000 in food & non-alcoholic beverage to be used towards conference banquet & coffee breaks.
