



Don't overlook what might seem like trivial details--e.g., comfortable chairs make all the difference during a 90 minute session ;-)

A smartphone app, though, is a great idea.

I know folks work hard to put on this conference, and I applaud those efforts. I realize there is a tradeoff between maximizing attendance and giving presenters more time to cover their work, so perhaps the "20 minutes per speaker" is the right solution. To me, though, it's unsatisfying.

Would enjoy being able to use my iPad for this, but didn't take the time to figure it out.

Some things I'm interest in: There were some differences of opinion expressed on the use of CLDs before or after or instead of full SD models. It would be a good topic to discuss (or is this an ongoing topic?) in terms of what to do based on how much time and funds people have in the real world. What do non-academics do?

Ms. Spencer,

After taking a week to think and reflect, I wanted to give you feedback about the conference. What started out rocky for our group ended up being an incredible experience. I have taken the Systems Dynamics course for two years now, and the only usage I have seen of the problem solving style was through Neal Mitchell (who has done amazing work with it, by the way). At the conference, I saw a variety of applications, ranging from

use for kindergartners to CEOs. Everyone was so friendly and welcoming, despite the age and schooling differences. We met people from all around the world and made connections with all sorts of people. For me, personally, I spoke to the WPI table multiple times about their Systems courses and their college, which is important to me as I will be going to college next year.

The presentations were, for the most part, eye-opening and insightful, to say the least. My favorites focused on education, biofuels, and global forecasting. Many of the presentations applied directly to what we have already done in our class, such as the presentation about the community garden and all of the education presentations. On top of it all, we spent **Thursday** working with STELLA and iThink. Although I had used them before, the workshop group gave me some new tricks, tools, and shortcuts. They were very helpful and I think our group truly benefited from the workshop. It has given us a head start on STELLA before the school year even begins, and has made Ms. Travers' and my job easier by helping show the students how and why STELLA works (which can be difficult to explain in a classroom sitting). The presentations have certainly given us a lot to think about and shape our course with as we proceed into its third year.

My only regret was with Camtasia; I was looking forward to helping presenters record their work, and I only wish some had signed up. It was a fantastic idea, and would have been a great opportunity for them,

As a recommendation for the conference in the coming years: the workshop day was incredibly helpful, and so helpful, in fact, that it would be better placed at the *beginning* on the conference. I know a few members of my group had the perspective of never learning about Systems before, and they would have found it especially beneficial.
